I would like to start with a formal thank you and greet our principal, Mr. Garrick, assistant principal Mr. Jones, school board president Mr. Doug Heil, the illustrious class of 2023, and all our parents, family, and friends who came to support us. My name is Richael Saka and I'm honored and humbled to stand before you today and speak on behalf of our class.
